Leadership Reports

President's Message

The Association continues to make progress addressing the known deficiencies with the dam and spillway. As a reminder, there are two primary issues that must be resolved: existing physical damage to the spillway structure and the need to bring the spillway into compliance with current regulatory standards.

To support this work, the Association continues to work with Apex Engineering to guide us through what is expected to be a multi-year process. Since then, Apex has completed an initial inspection of the spillway and related structures and has advised that additional investigation is needed before final repair designs can be completed. This investigative work is part of a standard, methodical approach and will allow appropriate repair options to be developed.

In parallel, the Association is continuing work related to the spillway's regulatory capacity requirements. This effort involves updated engineering analyses and ongoing coordination with the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. No final determinations have been made at this time, and all design options will depend on regulatory review and approval.

The Board has also engaged environmental legal counsel to assist with agency coordination and compliance. The Association remains focused on working collaboratively with its professional consultants and regulators to address these issues responsibly while minimizing impacts to the community. Additional updates will be provided as meaningful milestones are reached.

Goodbye, Joanie

An impromptu community "Goodbye and Best Wishes, Joanie" sendoff was held the morning of Christmas Eve to honor Community Manager Joanie Mayle before she left Lake Heritage. Some members dropped in for a few nibbles and a glass of sparkly wine to say goodbye and spread a little Christmas spirit. We wish Joanie well in her new endeavors.

Treasurer's Report

Dues and Assessments for 2026

At the January Board Meeting (8 January 2026) the board approved the association's budget for the financial year beginning 1 April 2026.

As a result of that approval the board also approved, (as required by the bylaws) an annual increase to the Dues & Assessments of 3.3%. This is the rate of the CPI as of 1 December 2025.

The below chart shows the dues payable for the financial year beginning April 1 2026. It shows the amount for all combinations of lots owned by members in Lake Heritage. It also shows the discount – The discount is calculated on the combined Dues & Assessments – **the Deed covenant fee is NOT included in the discount calculation** (R&R's ARTICLE XVI 1. The Treasurer shall grant a 3% discount on combined sums of the Annual Dues and Assessments).

The deed covenant is a fixed \$30 fee; it does not get discounted.

A member with a single lot will pay \$1470.88 after the discount plus the \$200 Spillway fee that has been reinstated = \$1670.88 if paid before end of March. (or \$1715.44 in total after 31 March.)

Dam and Spillway Status Update

This update summarizes LHPOA's progress in addressing the current conditions and requirements associated with our dam and spillway, as well as the next steps ahead. As a reminder, there are two long-standing matters that must be addressed:

1. Maintenance: Damage to the spillway floor requiring repair
2. Regulatory Compliance: The spillway does not meet current Pennsylvania design requirements

In late November, LHPOA engaged Apex Engineering to guide us through what is expected to be a multi-year process to address both items. Below is an overview of what has been learned to date

Maintenance Issue – Spillway Floor Damage

The damaged spillway floor is visible to anyone driving or walking past the structure and represents the most immediate maintenance concern. Unfortunately, the solution is not as simple as patching the broken concrete. Without addressing the underlying cause, any surface repair would likely fail again.

In late December, Apex completed a detailed inspection of the dam and spillway. This included visual inspections and ground-penetrating radar (GPR) to evaluate conditions beneath the concrete. Apex identified some seepage along walls and joints, which they consider typical. Importantly, they concluded that the significant damage is limited to the spillway floor.

Five specific “areas of concern” were identified where voids may exist beneath the concrete. These areas were marked with pink paint following the inspection. While GPR provided valuable insight, Apex has advised that additional investigation is needed to fully understand the size, cause, and extent of these voids. This next phase is expected to include drilling holes through the concrete, using cameras to inspect subsurface conditions, and potentially performing limited geotechnical testing. LHPOA is currently working with Apex to schedule this work.

Once these investigations are complete, Apex will finalize a repair design. The scope could range from grouting voids and replacing localized sections of concrete to replacing the entire spillway floor. Until testing is complete, the final approach is unknown.

If the repair proves relatively straightforward, LHPOA is hopeful that this maintenance work can be completed independently of the spillway capacity issue.

Regulatory Compliance – Spillway Capacity

This issue has existed for more than a decade and stems from changes in dam safety regulations. When the dam was built in 1965, the spillway was designed to pass 50% of the Probable Maximum Flood (PMF). Since then:

- The dam has been reclassified to a higher hazard category requiring 100% of the PMF, and
- The PMF itself has been redefined to assume a significantly larger rainfall event

As a result, the once compliant spillway does not meet current regulatory standards.

Over the past several months, the Dam and Spillway Task Force has worked with LHPOA's hydrology and hydraulics consultant, KPI, to closely re-examine the assumptions used in prior flood modeling. While the regulations are specific, many modeling inputs require professional judgment. Previous analyses relied on generalized and highly conservative assumptions, resulting in estimates that the spillway capacity was significantly below current requirements.

KPI has now completed a revised H&H analysis using refined assumptions and alternative modeling approaches. This amended analysis has been submitted to the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) for review. If accepted (with minimal revisions), the resulting spillway improvements would be noticeably simpler and less costly than those required under the previously approved analysis.

Apex is ready to begin preparing conceptual design options to increase spillway capacity upon PADEP's response to the amended H&H analysis, which ultimately defines the design conditions. We are hopeful to receive feedback from PADEP within the next few months.

PADEP has also identified several related items for review, including embankment stability and maintenance of certain pipes and valves. Apex has evaluated these items and, to date, believes there are no significant concerns and that any required work will be straightforward.

Refilling the Lake

In August 2025, LHPOA received a letter from PADEP referencing maintenance items identified in the 2024 annual dam inspection report, as well as findings from PADEP's February 2025 inspection. PADEP stated that the lake shall remain drawn down until the identified maintenance repairs are completed.

Following receipt of this letter, LHPOA determined that the most significant maintenance concern is the damaged spillway floor. Addressing this issue requires a professional engineering evaluation, development of repair designs, and completion of PADEP's permitting process—making it clear that this repair would not be a quick process. LHPOA responded promptly by scheduling an on-site meeting with PADEP and engaging engineers and contractors to begin evaluating repair options. At that time, LHPOA remained cautiously optimistic that the necessary repairs could be completed in time for PADEP to consider allowing the lake to be refilled in early 2026.

In September 2025, LHPOA hosted PADEP for an on-site meeting to review the proposed maintenance repairs and to better understand PADEP's expectations. While LHPOA's focus was on addressing the maintenance items identified in the August letter, PADEP also emphasized concerns regarding the spillway's capacity. During subsequent discussions, it became clear that PADEP intended to link lake refilling not only to completion of maintenance repairs, but also to progress on addressing the spillway capacity issue.

At a kickoff meeting involving LHPOA, Apex, and PADEP in January 2026, PADEP stated that the lake would remain drawn down until:

1. The maintenance repair items are satisfactorily completed, and
2. A Consent Order and Agreement (COA) addressing spillway capacity is executed.

During the meeting PADEP acknowledged that it might consider a temporary repair to the spillway floor to satisfy item 1 above, while deferring the long term, permanent design fix to be performed in conjunction with the spillway expansion project. LHPOA and Apex are currently evaluating the

viability of this option to see if it could provide a path to enable refilling the lake this 2026 season, although it is still unclear if PADEP will ultimately agree to any such plan.

It remains one of LHPOA's main objectives to work with PADEP on an agreeable solution to refill the lake for the 2026 season.

Next Steps

LHPOA has retained environmental legal counsel to assist with regulatory coordination and negotiations. Working alongside counsel and Apex, LHPOA's goal is to maintain a cooperative and constructive relationship with PADEP while minimizing impacts to the community as required repairs and long-term upgrades are addressed.

Currently, legal counsel is negotiating the terms of the lake drawdown with the objective of PADEP agreeing to allow the lake to be refilled once the maintenance repairs are completed, while deferring consideration of a COA until after the amended H&H analysis has been reviewed and responded to by PADEP.

In parallel, LHPOA—supported by Apex and an independent grant-writing consultant—continues to research potential funding assistance opportunities to help offset future costs.

LHPOA will continue to provide updates as additional information becomes available.

2026 LH Vehicle and Boat Stickers are available!

When payment for 2026 LH dues is received and vehicle and boat/watercraft registrations are brought to the office for verification, new 2026 stickers will be issued. You will need to apply the stickers to your vehicle or boat/watercraft as soon as possible.

Follow these steps:

- 1) Remove the old sticker(s) - ensure all remnants of the previous sticker are completely removed.
- 2) Clean the surface - thoroughly clean the area where the new sticker(s) are to be applied on the vehicle and/or boat/watercraft.
- 3) Dry the area - ensure the cleaned surface is completely dry before proceeding.
- 4) Apply the new sticker(s) - carefully place the sticker(s) onto the vehicle or boat/watercraft, ensuring proper alignment and adhesion.

Position of stickers:

- 1) Vehicle - Driver's side of the front bumper.
- 2) Boat/Watercraft - Two stickers are given. A sticker is to be applied on each side of the boat/watercraft affixed anywhere from center to stern. Owner's lot number must appear beside both stickers.

Stickers are non-transferable for LHPOA members in good standing.

Recycling Guidelines

- Place all recyclable items in the recycle cart provided by Park's Garbage
- Place the recycle cart curbside the evening *before* your scheduled pickup day.
- Make sure all items are free from food debris. Items contaminated with food will not be accepted.
- Most lids can be recycled, but they must be removed from the recyclable item prior to placement in the recycle bin.
- Park's provides a clear list of items accepted for recycle and items not accepted for recycle [below]. If non-recyclable items are found in your recycle bin, Park's will decline recycle pickup until the non-recyclable items have been removed.



Accepted Items

- Magazines and Phone Books (catalogs and soft cover books)
- Newspaper (inserts and brochures)
- File Folders and Office Paper (all colors; all non-paper objects such as paper clips or binder clips removed; cover paper with heavier objects to prevent it from blowing away)
- Mail and Greeting Cards (junk mail and envelopes)
- Corrugated Cardboard (boxes, paper bags and beverage holders, flattened and broken down)
- Paperboard Boxes (cereal, pasta and tissue, flattened and broken down)
- Paper Cartons (milk, juice and egg)
- Plastic Containers (#1 through #7; please rinse thoroughly; labels ok)
- Metal Cans (aluminum, tin and foil; please rinse thoroughly; labels ok)

NOT Accepted

- Glass bottles
- Plastic bags
- Window glass
- Mirrors
- Light bulbs
- Dishes (including Pyrex and ceramics)
- Paper towels and facial tissue
- Styrofoam
- PVC
- Recyclable containers that have not been emptied or rinsed
- Hazardous materials and medical waste
- Electronic waste including VCR tapes, CDs and DVDs
- Scrap metal
- Pots or pans

We DID IT!! 1,000 pounds of Plastic = One Bench for SCCAP

For the past two years, the Women's Club has been collecting soft plastics on behalf of the South Central Community Action Program (SCCAP) Food Pantry, with much-appreciated help from the Lake Heritage community and Talbots at the Outlets. It was one more way for the club to support a critical program serving the food insecure in Adams County.

The first bench was placed in the play yard of the Adams County homeless shelter. The new bench will be stationed at the food pantry to provide relief for the many elderly who visit. As much as possible, the pantry is set up to recreate a standard shopping experience. Patrons can push their carts along the aisles to select what they need from a variety of staples and the occasional treat.

The Recycle the Bag program is sponsored by NexTrex, a manufacturer of composite outdoor furniture and decking, which is open to nonprofit organizations. This program serves the dual purpose of keeping plastics out of the landfill and creating supply.

Several members volunteer for the SCCAP for the Gleaning and Pantry programs, and administrative office. SCCAP has offices in Adams and Franklin Counties and offers a variety of other programs to include gleaning at participating farms, weatherization, Women Infants and Children (WIC), homeless shelters, emergency funds, subsidized apartments, career training, advocacy, mentoring, and outreach.

Added to our members' private financial and food donations through the Giving Spree, we have contributed hundreds of boxes of turkey stuffing and potato mixes for the annual Thanksgiving dinners.

How it works:

The Finders: Individuals who find the rocks and are Facebook users should take a picture of the rock and post it on the [LH Rocks 17325](#) Facebook page. After posting, finders may choose to keep the rock or hide it somewhere else for another person to find. Someone who finds a rock may also be inspired to paint rocks of his/her own to hide.



A Few Rules:

- Never hide your painted rocks where they'll cause property damage or on private property without permission.
- Do not hide rocks in state or national parks because it violates the leave no trace principles and is considered litter/graffiti.
- Don't trespass to hide rocks
- Don't hide them in tall grass where lawn equipment could be damaged
- Be aware of your surroundings when hiding and searching for rocks

Decorating Tips:

- Always paint on clean rocks. If you find rocks outside to paint, a quick soap and water bath, scrub, and thorough drying should be fine.
- Acrylic paints and paint pens work best.
- If you are insecure about your artistic ability, feel free to Mod Podge stickers onto rocks.
- You should also always seal your rocks when you're finished painting them. You can use clear enamel from a spray can. Some people also use Mod Podge.

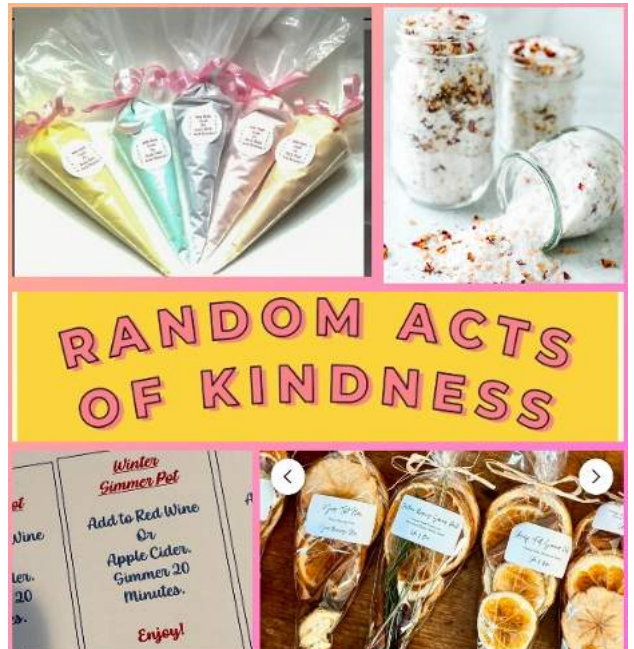

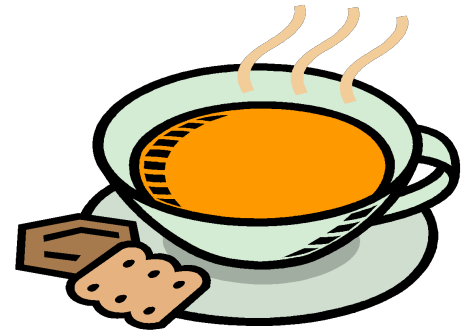
